The City of Virginia Beach is the only school district of which we are aware that denies administration of the PSAT to homeschooled students. HEAV Director of Government Affairs, Yvonne Bunn, testified before the Virginia Beach School Board appealing to them to revise their discriminatory policy against homeschoolers. The school board has indicated they will review their policy prior to administration of next year's PSAT. In order to prevent this from happening in other districts, HEAV, the Organization of Virginia Homeschoolers, and HSLDA are working together to clarify the language in the Virginia Code by introducing HB 1588.

The undefeated Lady Breakers (20-0) became the first homeschool sports team to be ranked by the Virginian-Pilot as an area top-ten team in their respective sport. The Beach Breakers were also the only non-public school team recognized. This recognition came after the Breakers defeated both the Metro and TCIS Championship teams during the regular season, and won the EVAC (Eastern Virginia Athletic Conference) regular season and conference tournament.


To culminate their season, the Breakers traveled to Omaha, Nebraska, to compete in the seventh Annual Home School National Girls Volleyball Tournament. This year's tournament had an all-time high of 28 teams competing for the championship.

The girls went 3-3 in a preliminary round against a strong team from Kansas and two strong teams from Texas. This round was designed to seed the teams for the next day's play. The girls then played in a bracket to determine which teams advanced to the Gold, Silver, and Bronze Brackets.

The Breakers advanced to the eight-team Gold Division by going 5-1 against teams from Missouri, Nebraska, and Indiana. The girls were then placed in a quarter-final match against a favored Kansas City team who had defeated the Breakers in the preliminary round (and won the tournament two years ago and came in second last year). The Breakers played inspired volleyball—perhaps the best they played all year—and defeated Kansas City 25-16, 25-15, 25-20 to advance to the Final Four.

In the semi-finals, the Breakers had to play the only undefeated team. The Breakers again played inspired volleyball and split the first two games 23-25 and 26-24, but lost the hard-fought contest by losing the final two games 25-20, 25-20.

Without a break, and having to play three successive matches in a row, the exhausted Breakers then lost to the Omaha home team for third place 25-14, 25-22.

Five Classical Cottage School students were among more than 1300 Latin students from Virginia's middle and high schools who met for the annual Virginia Junior Classical League convention in Richmond in November. They brought home 57 awards, including six Best-in-Show medals, and the top awards for academic excellence, for graphic arts, and for overall achievement at the convention. Classical Cottage School, Berryville, is a one-day-per-week school for homeschoolers interested in pursuing classical subjects.

Max Heidelberger placed first in Other Media among ninth graders with his scratch art "Thracian Gladiator," and fifth on the Mythology test among Latin Three students.

Sarah Mickahail's quilt, based on a Roman mosaic in Ravenna, placed first among eleventh-grade entries. She also captured first place among Latin Two girls in Dramatic Interpretation of Latin. Her presentation in Latin Oratory ranked second, and she placed ninth on her level on the Roman Daily Life test.

David Herman edged Sarah out for first place in level two Latin Oratory, and his presentation was judged Best-in-Show among all levels of Oratory. He also captured first place among Latin Two boys in Dramatic Interpretation of Latin. Competing among sixth- to eighth-grade delegates, he won first place in Storytelling and Games. David's Modern Myth placed fifth among middle school entries. In academic competition, he won second place in Roman History, fourth in Mythology, and sixth in Pentathlon, a test which covers mythology, Roman history and life, and Latin grammar, vocabulary, and derivatives. All these accomplishments won for David the fourth-place overall sweepstakes ribbon among delegates in grades six through eight.

Ingrid Heidelberger shared a Best-in-Show medal with Emma Leahy in the Couples Costume contest for their interpretation of the mythical characters Echo and Narcissus. Her other awards in creative arts include fourth in Dramatic Interpretation of Latin Prose and sixth in Advanced Latin Oratory. Competing among Latin Three students in academics, Ingrid placed second

in Reading Comprehension of Latin Prose, third in Grammar, and seventh in both the Latin Derivatives and the Latin Vocabulary tests. Her sculpture won second place among students in grades six to eight in graphic arts. Ingrid won the seventh-place overall sweepstakes ribbon for delegates on her grade level.

Emma Leahy brought home the "gold," with the first-place ribbon in sixth- to eighth-grade overall sweepstakes, four Best-in-Show medals, the Hugh Himwich Award for overall top achievement in academics, the Mary Julia Pomfrey Award for overall top achievement in graphic arts, and the Annie Aldridge Award for being the top winner among all delegates to the convention. In Latin Three academic tests she placed first and Best-in-Show in Roman History and Pentathlon, first in Classical Architecture, Mythology, and Latin Literature, and second in Classical Geography. In creative arts she paired as Narcissus with Ingrid's Echo to win first place and Best-in-Show in Costumes. She also placed first for her Modern Myth and her Advanced Latin Oratory, and second in Dramatic Interpretation of Latin Prose. In graphic arts, grades six to eight, she won first place and Best-in-Show for her Illustrated Quote. Also taking first place were her watercolor, pencil, ink, doll, T-shirt, jewelry, sculpture, pottery,

and small model entries. Her entries in oil/pastels and mixed media art placed third.

The CCS delegation won first place in the small-chapter division of the JCL-spirit contest, third place for its 2004-05 scrapbook, and fifth place for publicity. This year's Virginia Junior Classical League convention results are testimony that the CCS students took that motto to heart.



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
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




Helping Your Child Connect with God Gary Thomas

t is amazing to me that when it comes to issues of faith, we often see things only a certain way—how to worship, when to pray, what to read, where to go.... But some of what seems right to us might be too noisy, too quiet, too liturgical, or too strange to someone else. When it comes to abilities, likes, and preferences, we are not the same. And when it comes to the issue of loving God, we should not get tense and uptight when we don't worship the same way as others.

When I read through the Old Testament, I see Abraham building altars, David dancing or writing a psalm; in the New Testament, I see Mary sitting contemplating, Martha and Peter's motherin-law serving—yet all of these people loved God and were worshipping Him.

We wouldn't go to Zaire or Peru and expect the people there to worship God exactly the same way that a Baptist from Georgia or an Episcopalian from Boston





would, but often when we deal with our families, we expect the energetic kids and the meditative kids to fit into one mold when it comes to devotions or quiet time. I found that it just doesn't work that way. It's because God has created us different that we relate to Him in different ways.

You would take issue with me if I were to say that if you want to homeschool "God's way," then you have to use a certain curriculum. Yet, sometimes we think that if our kids don't use a particular devotional, maybe read the Bible for 15 to 30 minutes, and have a certain prayer time, that they just aren't committed. We become afraid. Yet every one of our hearts was made to love God, and every second of every day, God is reaching out to pull our children to Him. All we have to do is find the way to get them to connect.

Though always only through Jesus Christ, each of us is going to approach God a different way because of our spiritual temperaments. The challenge for us as we're raising children is to find the avenue that gives them the best chance to love God that we can. God loves our children passionately, and nobody else can give Him what our children can give—and that's their love. We want to get them to the place where they have best chance of enjoying a relationship

Here are nine spiritual pathways for you to consider as you help your children respond to God in love:

The Naturalist

The Naturalist is someone whose heart is awakened to God when he gets out of doors. Rooms seem artificial to a naturalist, but when he is surrounded by what God has made, he comes alive in his faith.

Many of the Old Testament theophanies, or appearances of God, occurred in the wilderness-with Hagar, Jacob, and Moses. And Jesus often walked though the countryside as he was teaching others. The very picture of Heaven on earth was the Garden of Eden. We didn't start out in a fancy hotel or resort, but in a garden. Psalm 19:1 says, "The heavens declare the glory of God and the firmament shows His handiwork." Romans 1:20 says, "For since the creation of the world, His invisible attributes are clearly seen, being understood by the things that are made." There is a sense that being out-of-doors does something to awaken our hearts to God.

If you find that you can't get your

child to sit still at his desk, or he is bored with devotional books, go on a walk and use nature to awaken his heart.

The Sensate

These are people whose best avenues to God are through their five senses. Just as for some people, walking through a forest calls their heart to soar towards God, for the sensate, it would be walking through a museum or visiting a cathe-

When I go through Scripture, I realize how loud and colorful God is. Some churches, by contrast, are so plain that, if you put down a different floor, you could have a gymnasium—there's nothing there except the walls. Yet Ezekiel shows God coming as a raging storm, and John shows Jesus in His glory, with eves shining like stars. The reaction of both prophets was to be awestruck.

A sensate is someone who would like to be in a church with beautiful architecture and majestic music. She is drawn to the grand and intricate, and likes high quality. Sensates recognize there is a connection between beauty and holiness.

There are four stages of worship for a sensate: appreciation leading to humility; a call to something better; a different worldview because the beauty of God changes them; and then a response leading to action.

For your sensate children, put on classical music, light candles, give them something meaningful to touch—like a nail during the Easter season. One-third of the cerebral cortex—the highest level of our brain-is devoted to sight, so make sure their sight is stimulated.

Traditionalist

Be careful that you don't tune this worship style out. It's easy to do so when you say "Christianity is not a religion, but a relationship." But, to a traditionalist, religion is not a dirty word-it is an outgrowth of his relationship. Abraham is a good example of a traditionalist. Everywhere he went he built altars—his way to show a commitment to, and

remembrance of, the Lord. Moses, also, gave his people many elaborate rituals to follow.

Some people need a sense of ritual in order to foster worship. According to Acts, Peter and John had set times for prayer. They knew they didn't have to do this to be saved; it was simply an important part of their faith. And Paul, the champion of salvation by grace through faith, followed the custom of praying by the riverside on the Sabbath, and observing ritual purification. Some religious elements can be meaningful to vour life.

There are three elements of a traditionalist to build in your children if you think this is their spiritual pathway. The first is rituals—like observing the Christian calendar.

The second is symbols. Dietrich Bonhoeffer said that he thought a good memory is essential for growth in holiness (otherwise, we forget powerful lessons and convicting words), so utilize meaningful symbols to remind your children of their faith.

The third part is sacrifice. Romans 12 teaches that our faith includes obligation. Giving an offering is one type of sacrifice that you can encourage in your children.

Ascetic

John the Baptist is an example of an ascetic. He was off on his own and liked solitude. Ascetics don't prefer the "group experience," but like to get away and be alone. They like austerity and quiet while they're in God's presence because they can be easily distracted. They also like strictness. Though this can look like legalism to others, they know they aren't trying to win God's favor through it, but are just worshipping Him.

If your child tends toward the ascetic, help him connect with God through night watches and retreats; through fasting and obedience; and in quiet work, so he can think and pray.

Are you like these parents?

We talk to a lot of parents who are exploring educational alternatives for their sons.

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The Activist

For this type of person, church might look like the best place to stop and collect signatures for a cause. These are the movers and shakers who often worship through confrontation with evil, and who want to accomplish things for God. An activist appreciates that she serves a God of justice, and her favorite Scripture is often the account of Jesus cleansing the temple (Mark 11:12-17).

If you have a child who has an activist tendency, get her involved in a spiritual cause of evangelism or righteousness, because if you don't, she will find some other cause to take up. Her relationship to God will be more energized in a group and by interaction (including conflict) with others than by being alone.

The Caregiver

These people love God best by loving others. What would exhaust some of us, gets them excited and draws them close to the Lord, because they picture God's heart for others. The caregiver could take care of the sick, work on someone's car, help someone reconfigure her computer system, or babysit for tired parents. A caregiver is comforted by Jesus' words, "Whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers of mine, you did for me." (Matthew 25:40)

Don't mistake the caregiver as a person who cares for others because his low self-esteem needs a reason to validate his existence. The Scriptural caregiver is expressing his love for God by serving others. Mordecai, from the book of Esther, is an example of a caregiver. He first cared for his niece, then his king, and then his nation.

The Enthusiast

An enthusiast is the cheerleader for God. He loves the excitement and celebration of the faith. He wants mystery as in answered prayer; celebration—like those of the biblical feasts; and expectancy—to take risks for the Lord, like starting up a ministry on a small budget.

Sometimes we are so concerned for our children's holiness and character that we neglect their need for enjoyment and celebration. But they don't want to just know Scriptural concepts, they want to experience and be moved by them. Help your enthusiast children dance, sing, draw, write, and be creative in their worship.

The Contemplative

These are the people who want to sit still and just enjoy being in God's presence. More than they would stress obedience or obligation, they just want to love God. This is marked by a sense of desire for relationship. In Mark 15, Jesus calls us to this: "No longer do I call you servants, but I have called you friends."

FREEDOM WATCH

2006 General Assembly **Session Summary**

ny good football coach will tell you the way to win games is to have a good offense—and an even better defense. HEAV approached the 2006 General Assembly session with this strategy in mind. On offense, we were ready to score points with several bills that would advance the cause of homeschooling. On defense, our objective was to defeat any bill that would undermine, or further restrict the gains we have already achieved.

Our team for this year's session included representatives from HEAV, the Organization of Virginia Homeschoolers, and HSLDA. As we prepared for the session, the strategy was to have each organization "run" with specific pieces of legislation that further clarified or strengthened our current homeschool statute. If hostile legislation was introduced, we would play defense by working aggressively to defeat it.

Offensive Efforts

Our offensive strategy in this year's session was to build on the success of legislative wins in previous years, and address several concerns related to the current homeschool statute. HEAV led the charge on the first bills below, HB 1340 and SB 499, and the Organization of Virginia Homeschoolers led on HB 1483 and HB 1588.

HB 1340 and SB 499 are companion bills designed to give homeschooling parents with a high school diploma the same oversight as parents with a college degree. Currently all parents who meet the requirements under the homeschool statute can homeschool. However, if you have anything less than a college degree, the law unnecessarily requires more oversight.

We strongly support this bill because: (1) homeschoolers have accountability measures in place through yearly assessments; (2) Virginia is the only state that offers an option that requires a baccalaureate degree; (3) data shows homeschoolers are doing a good job; and (4) test results show that children, whose parents have a high school diploma, are scoring 15 to 19 percentile points higher than the average student on nationally normed standardized tests.

Your HEAV legislative team has been aggressive at garnering support for this bill, winning new votes from both democrats and republicans, briefing the Deputy Secretary of Education, and positioning this bill to pass with strong bipartisan support. At this writing, HB 1340 has passed the House and SB 499 has passed the Senate. One delegate attempted to attach an SOL amendment to HB 1340 on the House floor, but it was quickly defeated. We expect these bills to pass through each house again, and then be signed into law by Governor Kaine, who supported this language two years ago.

HB 1483 would increase options for parents filing under option (iv) of the homeschool statute, and clarify the language regarding mid-year withdrawal of children from public school. It will also allow homeschoolers to meet the option (i) testing requirement by using ANY nationally normed standardized achievement test. In previous years, homeschoolers were subject to use the test approved by the State Board of Education. This gives homeschoolers greater flexibility in the selection of tests. This bill was voted out the full House 99-0, and we expect it to pass the Senate and be signed by Governor Kaine.

HB 1588 will require school districts to make the Advanced Placement (AP) and Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test (PSAT) examinations available to homeschooled students. This bill clarifies last year's legislation, which required school districts to notify homeschoolers of the availability of these tests. Some school districts interpreted this language as not requiring them to administer the tests. HB 1588 will require school districts to notify and make available these tests to homeschool students. HB 1588 passed the full House 99-0. We expect it to pass the Senate and be signed by Governor Kaine.

Defensive Efforts

There was only one bill that attempted to restrict the freedoms currently enjoyed by homeschoolers in Virginia. House Bill 537 would have required homeschool parents to notify the division superintendent anytime they changed curriculum. In addition, it gave the division superintendent new authority to terminate home instruction at any time if there was a "perceived" lack of progress.

HEAV vigorously opposed HB 537 by visiting extensively with the patron, Delegate Parrish, and other key legislators. When we could not resolve the issue privately, we openly testified against the bill at the sub-committee hearing, along with the Organization of Virginia Homeschoolers. We opposed it because it would reduce a homeschooling parent's ability to tailor instruction when appropriate, and it would increase the cost of education at the local level. The proposed probationary decisions extended the authority of the superintendent, while accountability measures already exist within the Virginia Code. The bill was presented to the House Education, Students and Daycare subcommittee and was defeated by a near unanimous voice vote.

In summary, your HEAV legislative team has worked hard to garner the support necessary to pass three very good pieces of legislation, and has helped to defeat the one bad bill in this year's General Assembly session. We are anticipating a winning record of 3-0.




Homeschool Graduates Now Considered "Preferred Enlistees"

This means that homeschool graduates who enlist in the military will be treated as Tier I candidates even though their formal status will remain Tier II. As a result of this change, homeschoolers will receive the same educational benefits, cash bonuses, and available


Start Your Own Family Internet Business! Dr. Joel Orr

nticipating the publication of my latest book (Every Man a Hero, Every Woman a Coach – www.everymanahero.com), I began researching Internet marketing at the beginning of last year. I have an advantage, in that the technicalities of Webpage design and construction are no mystery to me.

But what mysteries and confusion awaited me! I started with all the free stuff-e-books, teleseminars, and newsletters. And just when I'd think I was starting to understand some of the topics, someone would offer me a definitive guide to that very topic, for only \$47. And they'd throw in thousands of dollars' worth of bonuses, which were mine to keep even if I took advantage of their full-satisfaction refund guarantee! (I did do just that, more than once, and always without problems.)

Well, I bit. Hard. Again and again. I





refuse to say how much money I actually spent on this education, or how much time and energy I put into it. I'm just glad I have the opportunity to give you some of the benefit of my meanderings in this wonderland.

I'm not listing all the resources I found; the purpose of this article is to share with you how I got out of that mess!

But first, let me say this. I know for a fact that a surprisingly large number of people are making large amounts of money, in entirely moral and ethical ways, on the Internet. My guess is that the number of people making over \$5,000 per month is certainly in the tens of thousands, and may be higher.

Moreover, I personally know, and have seen the Paypal statements of, more than 20 marketers who are earning \$50,000 per month, and more. Regular people, not geniuses—but definitely action-oriented.

So I am thoroughly convinced that Internet marketing is a practical type of business for your family to explore.

But to give you an idea of what is so bewildering about it, consider this list of topics:

• Web-site design

- Search-engine optimization (SEO)
- Affiliate marketing
- Pay-per-click advertising
- E-book writing and marketing
- Ad tracking
- Ad testing
- Copywriting
- Long ad copy
- Teleseminars
- Audio and video on your site
- E-zines and newsletters
- Forums
- Articles and press releases
- Joint ventures
- Off-line events
- Coaching
- Autoresponders
- Shopping carts
- Banner and ad sales
- Fulfillment

That's just for starters. Then there's the joy of eBay; Amazon's Advantage and affiliate programs; Clickbank and Commission Junction; and much, much more.

Each of these topics has its own gurus, e-zines, e-books, forums, events, and coaches. And much to my amazement, much of it is reasonably good stuff. That's what got me so confused.

None of it gave me the whole story. I'd head off in one direction, but immediately get distracted by someone's great new e-book on a different slant. Eventually, though, I ran into Dr. Ken Evoy's SiteBuildIt!—SBI for short.

Ken is an MD who gave up doctoring to do Internet stuff full-time some years ago. SBI gives you a soup-to-nuts package—everything from education, to supporting software, to handholding, to forums where you can exchange information with other SBI people.

His package costs \$300 for a year, and it includes a domain (a URL) and hosting, as well as video training modules, brainstorming software, e-books on every aspect of Internet marketing, and more. The SBI newsletter makes it superfluous to subscribe to other e-zines, because it gives you all the important stuff.

The most important aspect of SBI, and its greatest differentiator, is that it has a step-by-step action plan that actually works.


Ken calls his approach, "The Way of the Tortoise," because he categorically does not promise overnight riches. But 63 percent of his customers are in the top 3 percent of money-earners on the Web, so something is working.

Whether or not you buy his service, you should consider his formula: First, build content—useful information that people will find via search engines. That will give you traffic, enabling you to build a list of people who know you, like you, and trust you. Then you pre-sell them, by sharing detailed information about the stuff in your product category. Finally, you monetize your efforts, by telling your visitors, "Now that I've educated you about the products in this market, here's what I'm selling, and here's why."

Your product may be hard goods, software, services, or downloadable information products—the possibilities are endless.

I've felt tremendously relieved, and am making genuine progress, since acquiring my SBI site. I haven't found anything as comprehensive as this package.

If you are considering Internet marketing as a possible source of income, you should explore more than one approach. But be careful that you don't get lost in the jungle of opportunities. And if you have any questions, feel free to write me—joel.orr@gmail.com.

positions in the Armed Services as any of their peers. Homeschool graduates are now able to compete on an equal footing with other types of graduates for the 80,000 positions in the Army, 30,000 in the Navy, 23,000 in the Marines, and 20,000 in the Air Force that need to be filled with new recruits annually.

HSLDA has been working with the military for several years to remove discriminatory barriers for homeschool graduates. Beginning in 1998, HSLDA secured a "pilot project" that lasted for six years where homeschoolers were experimentally treated as "Tier I" candidates—the same status as high school graduates from the public schools. In January 2005, the Department of Defense issued a letter stating that homeschoolers were considered "preferred enlistees" and that there were no "practical limits" to the numbers of homeschoolers who could obtain entrance into the Armed Services.

We expect the next defense bill, which is to be passed this year in Congress, to codify this arrangement to ensure that homeschoolers will continue to maintain preferred enlistment status and not be discriminated against when they seek entry into the military.



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
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
